COUNT ON US FOR CHILD SAFETY...

2005 meant stabilized homes and permanent, loving families for six wonderful children that were adopted. Three girls and three boys, ranging in ages from three years to nine years of age no longer live with the fear of not knowing in whose home they will be sleeping tonight. Our sincerest appreciation goes out to the special adoptive parents!

Sadly, in 2005, we continued to see a trend in reported child sexual abuse occurrences throughout the county. In 2005, the Pickaway County Sex Abuse Task Force, comprised of the Pickaway County Prosecutor's Office, Pickaway County Children Services, Pickaway County Sheriff's Department, and law enforcement received a total of 45 cases of alleged child sexual abuse. Of those cases, criminal charges were filed in 23 of the cases, with a total of 21 persons convicted of the offenses (19 male and 2 female). Of the individuals convicted, all were family members or family friends to the victim; there were no instances of a stranger being the perpetrator.

ADULT AND FAMILY SERVICES

COUNT ON US IN TIMES OF CRISIS...

2005 brought its share of disasters and emergencies across the nation. Pickaway County was no exception to that with a Winter ice storm and severe flooding early in the year. We were fortunate to be able to assist 28 families with individual needs resulting from the ice storm and flooding, totaling over \$30,000. In addition, Hurricanes Katrina and Rita had far reaching effects across the nation, and we were quick to respond to families and adults coming to the county for shelter and assistance. Six evacuee families were helped with special assistance through our local Prevention, Retention, and Contingency (PRC) program, as well as state and federal funding, to help with shelter and other emergency needs.

With over 95 medical insurance plans to choose from, to assist our elderly citizens understand and sort out their Medicare choices, PCJFS sponsored an enrollment and information fair. Staff and other community partners helped people to complete forms and to enter their information into the Medicare webpage. Staff continued to assist people throughout the enrollment period to understand their options and to choose a plan. In addition, after coverage became effective, special assistance was made available to resolve issues with pharmacies and insurance companies.

PCJFS received honors at a Quality Performance Conference in November, being recognized as only one of only six counties in Ohio to have a 100 percent accuracy rate in administering the Food Stamp program.

Continuing to build on early intervention strategies was a focus of the Child Support Division in 2005. Through continued cooperation with the Pickaway County Courts, enhancement of our Seek Work Program evolved. Unemployed obligors appearing in court, due to non payment of child support, are ordered by the Courts to attend various classes and receive coaching by employment counselors at our JOBS One-Stop. The goal is to break down barriers to employment and assist them in finding

Another strategy was developed to educate both parties to a child support case on what their individual responsibilities are and the responsibilities of the agency. A comprehensive packet of specific child support information was developed, which is provided to both parties at all administrative and judicial hearings when the child support order is initially established. The packet is designed to help parties understand the process and inform them of how they can find resources and assistance when needed.

JOBS One-Stop

COUNT ON US FOR EMPLOYMENT RESOURCES...

2005 brought with it a move of the JOBS One-Stop to our current location at 1080 U.S. 22 West, providing needed expansion of our facilities, allowing greater access for job seekers and employers.

The JOBS One-Stop became certified by the State of Ohio, allowing us special funding, specifically for marketing of the JOBS One-Stop and to enhance our resource room capabilities. The job seeker resource room is now equipped with ten computer work stations, including an ADA workstation for persons hearing or visually impaired, as well as many job seeker supplies including resume paper, reference materials, and a copier for job seeker use. To enhance marketing of the JOBS One-Stop, www.pickawayjobs.com was introduced, a vital resource for job seekers and employers alike. The website posts available jobs for local employers (free of charge), offers the availability for job seekers to search employment opportunities from anywhere, and also provides information on our partners to help clients locate other resources to assist them.
